

Jake's Plant Takes

Cucumis sativus

Commonly known as "Cucumber"

Cucumbers are a creeping vine belonging to the gourd family and is widely cultivated for multiple uses. It can be allowed to spread over the ground or it can climb up if you provide them with something to climb, like a trellis. They are a later season crop which means they can not be planted until the soil is warmer and there are no more chances of frost. Cucumbers require more space, which means they also require more maintenance. A basic fertilizer of 20-20-20 would be good for growing vines. Water well and make sure you water where the plant enters the ground.

The Basics

Water: Moderate, like well drained soil Sunlight: Full sun at a minimum of 6 hours Upkeeping: High (vine maintenance)

Fun Fact

Cucumbers are botanically a fruit, specifically a pepo which means it is mostly water.

Cucumber Varieties We Have This Year

Burpless Bush Slicer: Has a smaller seed cavity and is known for slicing and eating fresh.

Green Finger: Commonly used to make pickles. Can be grown with or without a trellis.

Capsicum

Commonly known as "Pepper"

We have three different types of peppers in the greenhouse this year. They require a lot of nitrogen to produce their peppers so they like soil that has high organic matter or when you add a lot of nitrogen fertilizers. They will keep flowering and producing peppers until temperatures drop. Peppers have a good root trait to be able to be grown in containers, making them able to be grown on your patio.

The Basics

Water: Moderate Sunlight: Minimum of 6 but as much as possible Upkeeping: Low to none

Fun Fact

There have been studies that link the consumption of peppers to increase oral hygiene.

Black Magic: Jalapeño pepper (2500 SHU) Revolution II: Red Sweet Bell Pepper Yolo Wonder: Green Sweet Bell Pepper

Citrullus lanatus

Commonly known as "Watermelon"

Watermelon is very similar to cucumber. It is in the same botanical family; there are a few similarities in growing them in your garden. Like a cucumber, watermelon is a vining crop but it is not suggested to be grown on a trellis. The watermelons that are produced will have to be supported and the best way to do that is to leave them on the ground. A basic fertilizer of 20-20-20 would be good for growing vines. Water well and make sure you water where the plant enters the ground. It is important to keep weeds away from watermelons as the weeds can be vectors for disease as well as shade the plant which needs a lot of sun.

The Basics

Water: Moderate but in well water retaining soil Sunlight: Full sun 6 plus hours Upkeeping: High (vine maintenance) The biggest watermelon grown in MN was 227.5 pounds.

Fun Fact

Watermelon Varieties We Have This Year

Sugar Baby: known for being sweet and having compact vines compared to other watermelon varieties.
